New public health order on COVID-19 hotspots

A new Public Health Order has been released in response to the recent surge of COVID-19 cases in Victoria.

The order directs that an affected person must not travel to NSW unless:

- They are a NSW resident
- They are entering to obtain medical or other care

Travelling from Victoria and feel unwell? Get tested immediately and isolate yourself.

COVID-19 community outbreaks are occurring in Melbourne, especially in these areas: Hume, Brimbank, Casey, Darebin, Moreland and Cardinia.

- To fulfil a legal obligation or give effect to a court order, or
- To provide an essential service as defined in the Order.

If an affected person enters NSW, they must self-isolate at their place of residence or another suitable place and remain there until 14 days have passed since the person was in a COVID-19 hotspot.



NSW Health has prepared <u>health advice</u> for people who have been in a hotspot in Victoria in the past 14 days.

People who breach the rules face an \$11,000 fine and six months in prison.

Steps to become a COVIDSafe business

Councils are encouraged to disseminate information to local businesses and community organisations on how to comply with the Public Health Order, with thousands expected to reopen their

doors this weekend after the easing of restrictions on July 1.

Businesses of all industries can visit <u>this page</u> to access COVID Safety Plan templates and register as a COVIDSafe business.

The NSW Government has developed the COVIDSafe Check app, which allows customers to give feedback in real time to businesses, and regulators for action where necessary.

Councils are asked to build on their community safety role by engaging with identified non-compliant local businesses and guide owners and operators to fulfil their obligations under the latest Public Health Order.

All enforcement action will remain a matter for the NSW Police Force.

Breach of orders made under the Public Health Act is a criminal offence and attracts heavy penalties. In the case of any business, the maximum penalty is \$55,000 and a further \$27,500 penalty may apply for each day the offence continues.

Snapshot of local government services

An updated snapshot of local government facilities and services is now online to assist councils as COVID-19 restrictions are progressively eased in line with public health orders.



The snapshot can be viewed <u>here</u> and is for guidance only. Decisions on whether to open a facility or service remains a matter for individual councils.

Even if a service or facility is able to remain open, councils should as much as possible apply <u>restrictions on gathering and movement</u> and the <u>4m2 rule</u>, maintain <u>physical distancing requirements</u> and good <u>hygiene</u> practices consistent with NSW Government advice.
