

This week I had the pleasure of visiting the RSPCA NSW Sydney Shelter at Yagoona to mark the completion of the first stage of the centre's \$12 million expansion.

I was joined by RSPCA NSW CEO Steve Coleman in a tour of the shelter and the construction works of the new Companion Animal Village, an adoption facility funded by the NSW Government.

This expansion will ensure the facility can meet the space, welfare, health and safety needs of the animals, staff, and community now and into the future.

I was also pleased to see the beginning of online workshops to equip aspiring female candidates to run for their local council at the September 2021 local government elections. The NSW Government has formed a partnership with Women for Election Australia to deliver a series of online and face to face workshops as part of our commitment to increase female representation on our 128 local councils.

Finally, I ask that all local councils to please continue to promote COVID Safe messaging in their local communities.

It's as important as ever to highlight the importance of practising social distancing and good hygiene, getting tested if you have any symptoms, complying with restrictions, and wearing face masks where you cannot stay 1.5 metres apart from other people.



### Equipping women to stand for their local community

Women across the State have logged on to a series of online workshops to equip them to run at next year's local government elections.



The series of online workshops, which will run through to November and are booked out, provide prospective candidates with the knowledge and tools required to stand for election.



## Outdoor dining red tape slashed in time for summer

Outdoor spaces are being opened up for alfresco drinking and dining just in time for the warmer weather with the NSW Government slashing red tape to allow quicker approval times for venues.

The new measures will condense what was previously a three-month process involving multiple agencies, into a single application that takes a week. They will be rolled out first in The Rocks from today (October 16) and across the City in November as part of a pilot.

# Far West communities to benefit from TCorp funding expansion

Broken Hill City Council and Wentworth Shire Council will receive a combined \$12 million funding boost to build vital community infrastructure thanks to the NSW Government's \$395

million COVID-19 Local Government Economic Stimulus Package.

The Government provided a \$250 million boost to the TCorp local government lending facility and expanded eligibility for six months to enable more councils to access low interest loans to fund new and upgraded infrastructure.

## Further funding boost for bushfire-affected communities

Businesses and communities in bushfire-impacted regions have access to a new fund for local infrastructure and initiatives that will drive economic and social recovery, strengthen morale and help communities get back on their feet.



Councils, business chambers, joint groups, businesses, charities and local Aboriginal Land Councils are encouraged to bring forward their recovery ideas when applications open for the \$250 million Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund.

## Bushfire Community and Resilience Fund Stream 2 now open

Councils are reminded that applications are open for Stream 2 of the Bushfire Community Recovery and Resilience Fund (BCRRF).



The initiative will allow for more immediate funding to flow to local councils, community groups and not-for-profit organisations in support of medium and longer-term projects.

### Integrated Planning and Reporting reminder

Councils are reminded to ensure key documents are accessible on their websites to provide transparency and accountability to the local community.



These documents include operational plans, budgets, fees and charges, delivery programs and community strategic plans.

OLG considers it to be best practice that councils also publish resourcing strategies, including long term financial plans and asset management plans, on their websites.

The documents should be able to be easily sourced on the website by members of the community and named according to the Integrated Planning and Reporting requirements.

# Expansion works milestone at RSPCA shelter.


The exciting next chapter of NSW's largest animal shelter began this week as the first stage of expansion work reached completion at the RSPCA NSW



Sydney Shelter at Yagoona.

The new \$12 million Companion Animal Village will improve kennel and cattery facilities, allowing even more furry animals to find a home as well as increase capacity for various educational, training and community programs.

The investment builds on a previous \$7.5 million contribution by the NSW Government to rebuild and refurbish veterinary facilities at the RSPCA centre.
