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THE COMMISSIONER: Good morning, we will commence the public hearings of the Central Coast inquiry again this morning. I just wanted to make a few remarks before we do start. Thank you very much to Mr Kielly who has been working overnight to ensure that the live stream can proceed this morning. I believe it is now operating. We have tested this morning.

The cure to the problem wasn't as simple as some people might like to think. It took multiple software layers in order to get through the firewalls and the security systems of DPIE, but that has been done so the public can view the proceedings this morning.

If for any reason the broadcast is interrupted, please let us know via the inquiry email address. Please do not email the Office of Local Government or the minister, and any emails should be done in a respectful manner, I ask.

The video of yesterday's proceedings will be available on the inquiry website for 24 hours. There is no copying or reproduction of that video permitted, as is there no copying or reproduction of the live stream permitted.

I will just explain that there are lawyers present for certain parties in the proceedings. That is due to, one, permission being granted for certain parties to be legally represented. You will note from my opening remarks the reasons for that. Also I have received some advanced notice of possible applications to cross-examine witnesses and some lawyers are present for that purpose.

There are also a number of other supporting technical staff whose initials will appear on the Teams page. They are assisting with transcript, administration and the live stream, and also the inquiry's officer assisting, Katrina Annis-Brown, is also present.

Could I have a reminder to everybody to turn their cameras off and microphones on mute at all times until they are asked to speak or appear. Thank you.

Now, we'll get started for this morning. Thank you very much for the early start so that we could complete Ms Smith's evidence. Could I ask for Mr Smith and her legal representative to come on screen and camera, please.

1 <JANE SMITH, on former affirmation:</p> [9.01am] 2 3 THE COMMISSIONER: Mr Williams, I think yesterday afternoon you were going to update me on a document that 4 5 I'd referred to in Ms Smith's submission? 6 7 MR WILLIAMS: Yes, I'll turn over to Ms Smith in relation 8 to that. 9 10 THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you, Mr Williams. 11 12 THE WITNESS: Yes, Commissioner, I think you referred 13 to - I had listed three council meetings where there had 14 been reports on the amalgamation and you queried 23 March 15 2020. When I went back and had a look, what occurred at 16 that time is there was a scheduled ordinary meeting of 17 council for 23 March. 18 19 What happened is COVID hit and I think that was the 20 week that we may have been placed under stay at home orders 21 except for work or essential purposes. So that meeting was 22 cancelled, but council held an extraordinary meeting 23 instead that only dealt with urgent matters, so that report 24 was then not discussed until 27 July. 25 26 THE COMMISSIONER: I see. 27 28 THE WITNESS: From what I can tell, it was the same report 29 with some fairly minor changes. So although the report 30 appeared on 23 March, that meeting didn't proceed. 31 32 THE COMMISSIONER: Yes, thank you very much. That 33 explains it. 34 Could I just go back to one thing we were talking 35 about yesterday, which is the IPART decision which was made 36 37 shortly before the operational plan and budget in 2019. 38 You said yesterday, I think, that no adjustment was made to 39 the budget as a result of that. 40 41 THE WITNESS: Could I actually correct or expand on that, 42 if I may, Commissioner? What I said was that there was an 43 increase in the deficit as a result and that my 44

recollection is that there were other changes made to the

45 budget. Overnight I had a look through my records and there is a presentation from 3 June 2019 that was provided 46

47 to councillors from staff. That was a specific

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presentation about the impact of the final IPART determination. I would be happy to provide that to the inquiry, if you don't have it already. So that outlined the impact of the IPART decision.

 What it also reminded me is that there was a draft decision in April and staff had made changes to the operational plan at that point based on the IPART's draft determination. The final determination made a further adjustment and that's what this presentation refers to that I will send to you.

So that work that staff did on the draft determination did include some deferral of projects, and some other adjustments in terms of employees and the like.

THE COMMISSIONER: Yes. I don't have that presentation document of 23 June, so that would be useful if you could provide that.

THE WITNESS: Sorry, 3 June, Commissioner.

THE COMMISSIONER: Sorry, 3 June. That would be useful. Do you know whether the draft determination was significantly different from the final determination?

THE WITNESS: My recollection is that the draft determination I think was around about a 9 or 8.6 per cent impact and then the final - sorry, I might have that wrong, but the difference between 8.6 and 10 was the difference, yes.

THE COMMISSIONER: So there was a greater impact and hence the further presentation to the councillors.

THE WITNESS: Correct.

THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you for clarifying that. I don't have any further questions about your submission. Thank you, it is very comprehensive. There may be some cross-examination of you concerning the recruitment of the general manager. That's not something that you addressed in your submission.

Q. Can I ask you your recollection of the method or the process that you went through to appoint Mr Murphy as the general manager?

1 A. Yes. 2 3 MS ANNIS-BROWN: I apologise, Commissioner and Ms Smith, 4 I believe we may be experiencing difficulties with the 5 stream once more. Perhaps we could just adjourn for five 6 minutes while we continue to sort out what the issue is. I 7 do apologise. 8 9 THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you for letting us know, 10 Ms Annis-Brown. 11 12 I'm really sorry, Ms Smith, but we will have to 13 interrupt it there. If you could just sit tight to see if 14 the problem has an easy fix. 15 16 THE WITNESS: Thank you, Commissioner. 17 18 THE COMMISSIONER: It's very frustrating for everybody. 19 Thank you. 20 21 SHORT ADJOURNMENT 22 23 THE COMMISSIONER: Hello again, everyone. I'm sorry, it 24 is not good news. As we committed yesterday to suspending 25 the proceedings in the event that we could not continue 26 with the live stream, I'm terribly sorry, but we are going 27 to have to adjourn the proceedings. I don't want to do 28 what we did vesterday and just keep coming back every hour 29 or so, because I don't expect that there's going to be a resolution in the short-term. 30 31 32 Mr Williams, did you need to speak to me in any 33 manner? 34 35 MR WILLIAMS: The only difficulty that I could potentially foreshadow, Commissioner, is that I have another up 36 37 avoidable court commitment at 11.30am tomorrow morning in a 38 different jurisdiction. I'm content to appear for as long 39 as I can beforehand, but I'm afraid I couldn't change that 40 client or do anything to that client at this point in time. 41 THE COMMISSIONER: I understand. We will invite those 42 43 people who are legally represented for their legal 44 representatives to liaise with Ms Annis-Brown as to their 45 availability. We will have to rejig the whole schedule, unfortunately. We already had three other witnesses 46 47 scheduled for today. We will be in contact with everybody

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who was going to be giving evidence today and we'll have to compact the timetable a little bit more. We will take into account your availability, Mr Williams. MR WILLIAMS: Thank you, Commissioner. THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you. I'm sorry, but we will adjourn and we will put a notice on the website to inform the public of the reason for that adjournment and we will be in touch as soon as we have a solution to the issue. I apologise, Ms Smith, once again your evidence is I will now conclude today's proceedings. AT 9.30AM THE HEARING WAS ADJOURNED ACCORDINGLY J SMITH
