# TRANSCRIPT OF 2GB RADIO BROADCAST

Aired on 9 November 2017

Participants: Mr Ray Hadley Mr Matt Kean MP

 RAY HADLEY: Now, I have been reporting about asbestos issues at the Blue Mountains City Council for quite some time, but I've been contacted by people concerned about dangerous asbestos at a public hospital in the Blue Mountains - and you'd better wait for this one: it was identified 20 years ago.

I can reveal a report that I have in front of me on Blue Mountains District Anzac Memorial Hospital, which is

currently better known as Katoomba Hospital. This report in May discovered numerous locations of friable asbestos. Now, "friable" means that it's disintegrating and could be

inhaled by people.

Areas which were given the highest danger rating, priority 1, include the women's and children's ward, the child assessment and development unit, and the medical imaging and other areas. These locations are commonly used by the public, patients and staff, but I'm told there are still no safeguards or asbestos warning signs in place.

A New South Wales Health report notes that some of the friable asbestos was identified in 2013. Many areas were also identified as contaminated with asbestos in a report in 1997 conducted by the New South Wales Environment Management and Technology at the request of the New South Wales Department of Public Works and Services. The 1997 report says:

There is considerable asbestos-containing material, some of it loose --

"friable", in other words --

and easily disturbed.

And that's the most dangerous type of asbestos: once you disturb it, you're in all sorts of strife.

Particularly, the report raises concerns about asbestos lagging material used to insulate pipes - everyone did it in the old days - the debris from which has contaminated other areas, including ceiling cavities.

The report's recommendation says:

The preformed asbestos lagged pipes are to

be removed prior to any work being done in the area.

There are concerns, in the 20 years since, asbestos-contaminated material such as these pipes, which were meant to be fixed or labelled, have been disturbed by tradesmen and staff who are unaware of the problem.

Most of the priority 1 rated locations of asbestos noted in the 2017 report are contaminated by debris from the asbestos lagging material on the pipes identified way back, 20 years earlier, in 1997. And it comes from the asbestos management register for Katoomba Hospital, more commonly known as Blue Mountains District Anzac Memorial Hospital. These are public documents which can be accessed by any member of the public, which we have done, and I've got them here in front of me, and there is a grave concern.

 Now, I've been attacking Blue Mountains City Council, and with some justification in light of what we've found out about what they are doing there, but now we find out the whole thing extends not just to the council but also to the State Government or successive State Governments who have been inactive.

In the meantime - back we go to Blue Mountains council - SafeWork New South Wales has commenced a full investigation into asbestos management practices at Blue Mountains City Council. SafeWork New South Wales has also issued 17 improvement notices and four prohibition notices in relation to asbestos management at council sites since the completion of council's asbestos management plan. This includes a prohibition notice at a preschool in Wentworth Falls - which we, of course, told SafeWork about - directing them to identify and assess the condition of all asbestos-containing materials and to put in place appropriate controls to safely manage those materials.

 SafeWork New South Wales has also issued an improvement notice directing council to undertake more comprehensive asbestos testing at the preschool. The preschool will remain closed until SafeWork New South Wales determines that the prohibition notice has been complied with.

Now, I notice that the acting general manager of Blue Mountains council has put out a release herself, saying,

"Oh, look, it's unlikely that we will open it before its closing date", which is this Friday. Well, of course you won't reopen it. You've got nothing to say about it. It's being controlled by SafeWork New South Wales, not by you. So please don't tell fibs to your staff and to your constituents. You've got nothing to do with it. It's been closed down by SafeWork. You did nothing about it, Blue Mountains City Council.

SafeWork New South Wales will remain vigilant to ensure Blue Mountains City Council workplaces comply with work, health and safety laws in relation to asbestos safety, and they have to go to the next step now: they've got to make sure that this hospital, like the preschool, is a safe place for people to go.

Minister for Better Regulation in New South Wales, responsible for SafeWork, is Matt Kean. Minister, good morning.

MATT KEAN MP: Good morning, Ray.

 RAY HADLEY: I initially wanted to talk to you about how we're going with this look at Blue Mountains City Council, but there are other things to talk about, including the place known as Katoomba Hospital or Blue Mountains District Anzac Memorial Hospital, and whether you know about that place as well.

But let me deal with the council first of all. I know this is not your deal, but I, for the life of me, can't understand why the government hasn't appointed an administrator to take control of this council, given - they are reacting now, but by geez, Minister, they had to be carried kicking and screaming to the table to actually do something about this place.

 MATT KEAN MP: Yeah, Ray, the whole thing up there seems absolutely shambolic. The situation is nothing short of a disgrace. Nothing appears to be written down, and the records appear to be inaccurate. No-one at council seems to have any understanding about what their responsibilities are or what actually is going on at the site. And we saw that with regards to the Wentworth Falls preschool, which I know you've been very passionate about, which SafeWork went out to inspect on site and they discovered that the council records were in conflict with the reality, and that

just seems to be the tip of the iceberg.

So, Ray, I've ordered that SafeWork commence a full investigation into the asbestos management practices of Blue Mountains City Council. And let me tell you this, Ray: if there is a breach of the law here - and we've already issued eight prohibition notices - then I think that's very strong ground for the Minister for Local Government to take further steps.

RAY HADLEY: Now, just so I know technically where she can act - and I don't expect you to have thorough knowledge of it, but maybe you can help me: if there's any breach - one breach, not 10, not 14, but if there's one breach - can that be the tipping point for a minister to sack a council?

MATT KEAN MP: Look, I'm not across the exact details of the Local Government Act, but it's my understanding that the minister is looking at these issues very closely. I spoke to her this morning. I understand they are getting legal advice and they will have more to say in the coming days.

 RAY HADLEY: Okay. Well, it's just that a lawyer, who is obviously not attached to the council but lives in the area, wrote to me and said, "Ray, if there's one single breach, the government is entitled to and should act almost immediately." How many breaches have we found so far?

MATT KEAN MP: We've had eight breaches so far, Ray, and I've connected my SafeWork inspector, the head of SafeWork, Peter Dunphy, to Minister Upton this morning. So that's being worked through as we speak.

RAY HADLEY: Okay. Now - good, thank you for the update on that. If I can then go to this Blue Mountains District Anzac Memorial Hospital. I don't know if you heard my comments earlier about what's been discovered and the report that we have in front of us, but it would appear that, somehow, this one has slipped through the cracks as well. It appears there's friable asbestos up hill and down dale. Are you aware of this one at all?

 MATT KEAN MP: Yeah, Ray. I heard your comments earlier. The brief update I had while I was waiting on hold was that there was a report done in 1997, for goodness sake, identifying these issues. So I've just called my head of

SafeWork to go and find out what's going on. The SafeWork inspectors will be onto that today, Ray, and I'll come back on your program and give you a further update later in the week, if that's okay.

RAY HADLEY: Okay. Well, I'm here until Friday. I'd expect, based on our conversation this morning, that Minister Upton may move against the council between now and when we go off air on Friday. But, anyway, I know that Mark Levy will be all over it next week as well. But I appreciate your time today --

MATT KEAN MP: No, thanks for --

RAY HADLEY: -- and we'll talk again later in the week. Thank you.

MATT KEAN MP: Good on you, mate, bye.

RAY HADLEY: Thanks. That's Matt Kean, the Minister for Better Regulation, responsible for SafeWork New South Wales. I've got to say that until he got involved, well, I was banging my head against a brick wall, and as soon as he found out about this, he got SafeWork up there, they've closed down Wentworth Falls Preschool. They've now got eight breaches, and according to the lawyer who lives in the area that's emailed me, he said, "Ray, one breach is all that's required - one breach - to sack the council and appoint an administrator."

There's a smell about Blue Mountains City Council. It's odious. It's just absolutely - there's an odour there that needs to be investigated about the mayor, his links with the Labor member in the area and the sort of appointment of friends from within the energy sector to key positions at Blue Mountains City Council.

"Marky the Sparky": the union's called a number of times, United Services Union, for him to go, and somehow there's a protection racket being run out there to protect him. He's the bloke that was contracted to the council to examine this. Found no problems. And he's the bloke now employed by the council who also found no problems. "Marky the Sparky" should be put on the XPT, sent back to Bathurst, and there he should stay.

RAY HADLEY: And Zoe's done an incredible job in all of this, who is one of my team here, and - they all do great jobs, but Zoe has been absolutely forensic through all of this, and I would say that there are people now in Blue Mountains City Council that fear her phone calls, because she knows more about asbestos and Blue Mountains City Council than anyone working for the council ever knew, including "Marky the Sparky", and if someone - you can't pinch her off me, but if someone in Blue Mountains City Council wants to appoint someone with absolutely no history with discovering asbestos, she might be the one you need to pinch, because she knows more about it than any individual in the council. She knows more about it than any individual in the council, which tells you that someone in the council isn't really dotting the "i"s and crossing the "t"s.

As I've said, I've found corruption within RAY HADLEY: 1 2 the Blue Mountains council, and we go through it in leaked 3 emails. 4 5 This all started with asbestos being illegally dumped at Blackheath and Lawson. Then we found out it was at 6 7 Springwood as well, and workers were not told, after they found it two and a half years ago, that there was asbestos 8 at that Springwood depot. Men, women, and younger men have 9 been subjected to it, and it was May this year that the 10 council decided to come clean. 11 12 It led me to a whole range of other things: 13 the boys' club, where it appeared that people who had a connection 14 15 with the electricity sector seemed to be favoured to gain management positions. Once you are satisfied that this is done, the requisition is updated with quote reference from TRIM file, and let me know and I can remove the hold.

What these blokes have done, they've been warned by an officer of the council that they haven't followed procedure in procuring the services of a number of people. And what the advice is, a suggestion that Grant McKay produce a document for each purchase: in other words, get a document that proves that they did do it correctly. A document for each purchase called, "Analysis and acceptance of written quotations report".

We started looking at this council because of asbestos. We now find corruption. The minister should intervene immediately and stand down the council, based on this and this alone. Forget about the asbestos, because in 40 years' time, some of these poor buggers who were either at Springwood, Lawson or Blackheath could be confronting the most dire of circumstances, but this proves that this council is corrupt; that they give jobs to their mates, to their golfing partners, to their former colleagues from Country Energy or Endeavour Energy, and it's been going on for quite some time.

Now, last night there was a farewell for the outgoing general manager, Robert Greenwood. The MC was the mayor, Mr Greenhill. Out of 550 staff that work at the council, about 30 entered the venue. It was held at the Blue Mountains Cultural Centre and drinks and food provided.

 This is quite remarkable. The stood-down Stuart Liddell attended and had drinks with the very people embroiled in these issues, and he shouldn't be speaking to those people. If you either stand down on a voluntary basis, as he's done, or you're forced to stand down, it means you hand back your phone, your keys, and you have no contact with council staff in any way while investigations are finalised.

The mayor knows that Stuart Liddell should not have been there last night. "Marky the Sparky" was there as

well.

Stuart Liddell was formerly the HR chief. He writes the letters to stand down staff and delivers them to staff. There's no excuse for this. Don't forget, he also signs directors to gag orders, and used over \$200,000 of public funding to secure their silence. That's money I believe paid to the aforementioned Mark Bruhn.

Now, this is not me speculating. These are documents that have been leaked to me by the council, by people in the council who are very concerned about the level of corruption at the council, and that needs to change and change immediately.

The documents will be forwarded to the minister. She's unavailable to speak to me today. We will be following it up, if not today, certainly again on Monday. It's a damned disgrace.

Workers are being left in the lurch out there over asbestos. That's where we started. We had no idea where we were heading, and now we find other things happening, including corruption, where documents are being doctored on the advice of people within the council.

 The metropolitan manager of the United Services Union, who was the acting general secretary - his permanent position is metropolitan manager now - is on the line. Steve Donley, g-day.

STEVE DONLEY: G-day, Ray, how are you?

RAY HADLEY: Not bad. I don't know if you heard my comments this morning in relation to what's been discovered by my staff and given to me by one of the people who no longer works at council.

STEVE DONLEY: Thank you, I --

RAY HADLEY: Who - yeah.

STEVE DONLEY: Sorry, mate. Yeah, I heard you've got some emails about Grant and Stuart --

RAY HADLEY: Mmm.

STEVE DONLEY: -- and the interview panel for Mark - the position, yes.

RAY HADLEY: Yeah, Mark Mulligan. Well, without going through it all again, Steve, what it is, for people that may have missed it, there's a process that has to be followed before you employ people, a tender process, and a gentleman on the executive discovered that this process had not been followed.

STEVE DONLEY: Mmm-hmm.

He passed it back to the general manager, who RAY HADLEY: gave it to the human resources manager, who is the stood-down acting general manager, Liddell, who gave it back to this bloke, Mark Bruhn, who's the one that's left the council - and I don't know whether he's the one that sent it to me, but I guess he's the most likely source, given that he's no longer employed by the council; hasn't much - not much to lose. And it illustrates that they have connived - council officers - to backdate all of the information so that people would think there'd been some sort of process or selection process that adhered to the council policy. That's what it appears from the email trail I've got. It all happened in November, and if you follow it through - November last year - you'll - you can see it, and I will make it available to the minister, who is not available to me today.

But this started, Steve, by looking at asbestos in three areas - Lawson, Blackheath and Springwood - and the fact that people knew about it in May, or officially knew about it, but knew about it well before that, and never told the workers. We believe at least two or three years ago they knew about the asbestos.

But what we have discovered, Steve Donley, is by going through that, reams of information have come to me, and it illustrates that asbestos is a major problem, and the treatment of workers is a major problem, but corruption's also a major problem inside Blue Mountains council.

STEVE DONLEY: Yeah, we'l, we've certainly sent letters off requesting that, and we had a meeting with the mayor and the general manager on Tuesday, Ray.

RAY HADLEY: Mmm.

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STEVE DONLEY: And they told us that they were certainly investigating the appointment of Mark Mulligan, but also they're also hiring a private company to do the investigation into the allegations of the asbestos, of when it was actually noted.

RAY HADLEY: Did you accept that the asbestos - they someone in council, senior people, knew about this asbestos either in 2014 or 2015? Do you accept that?

We believe that's the case but we have no STEVE DONLEY: We've been requesting the evidence. direct evidence.

RAY HADLEY: Yeah.

STEVE DONLEY: We're still waiting for that evidence.

RAY HADLEY: Mmm.

STEVE DONLEY: And we request more, with more letters, and then now what we're being told is that they're going to hold - they're going to get their solicitors to get some private companies in to do the private investigations into So it's all done up in a report.

RAY HADLEY: Have you got - confident that this - that the solicitors - they've been the solicitors for council, I'm not suggesting anything untoward with them, they've been there for decades - are you happy with them appointing an independent investigator?

STEVE DONLEY: Yeah, because we've done our investigation on Clyde & Co, the company that there - or the gentleman that is going to do the investigation for the asbestos.

RAY HADLEY: Mmm.

STEVE DONLEY: And he's a highly respected health and safety lawyer, so we don't have a problem with him doing the investigation.

We've got - we've got certain information as well. once the investigation - once their investigation's done and they do a - give us an outcome, if it doesn't marry with what our - what we've got, then of course we will challenge.

STEVE DONLEY: After it's been paid. Yep. Yep. Well, certainly we have - not that exact information that you've got; certainly your intelligence on it, around the recruitment stuff, is very, very good. We've got - we've been told about this, we wrote letters, and now when we raised it again the other day we got told that they can't give us anything yet, pending the investigation. Once the investigation - then we'll receive the letters and that. But your information and our information is coming pretty close.

 RAY HADLEY: Okay. All right, then. Well, we'll keep And, as I said, my major concern at the moment chasing it. is still for these poor workers who weren't told about the asbestos at Springwood, and also at Blackheath and at Lawson, but mainly at Springwood, which is a depot where men, women, young men, apprentices, were all the time, and their families are greatly concerned. That's one aspect of But in uncovering that mess, we uncover what appears to be, and is, in my opinion, corruption among senior council officers that needs to be identified. calling on the minister, and she's out of the state today, I'm calling on the minister on Monday to I understand. appoint an administrator to take charge of this council before documents start to get burned, destroyed and a whole range of other things could happen.

Unfortunately for them, I've got the documents here in front of me, sent to me, I believe, by someone who's no longer employed by the council, who decided to blow the whistle on them.

STEVE DONLEY: Mmm. Well, I don't think they'll be burning any paperwork now, Ray.

RAY HADLEY: Well, not that they know I've got it, and it's just disgraceful.

And the other thing about this Liddell bloke, who stood himself down as acting general manager, he attended the farewell last night for the general manager, Mr Greenwood, and under guidelines of the council, he's not supposed to have anything to do with anyone while this investigation is conducted into his behaviour.

In general rules of thumb, when STEVE DONLEY: Yes. 1 2 they - when somebody is stood down, they're told to they're not allowed to have contact with anyone within 3 4 council: they're not to come to council until they get 5 their - the directions from the general manager. 6 7 RAY HADLEY: Mmm, yeah, well, he was at the farewell --8 STEVE DONLEY: 9 So we were - we were tipped off --10 RAY HADLEY: -- last night and he was there with 11 12 Mark Mulligan and a whole range of other people that he shouldn't have had contact with, that he did have contact 13 with. 14 15 STEVE DONLEY: 16 No, I agree. So this was well and truly after you had copped the \$65,000 - well and truly after you had copped it.

So, "Marky the Sparky", the weasels to whom you refer are people who understand the money that's being paid to weasels like you comes from the ratepayers of Blue Mountains, and they're not happy, I wouldn't think, about you getting money without a quote being asked for, because of your association with Stuart, spelt S-T-U-A-R-T, Liddell.

RAY HADLEY: And all you're doing, "Marky the Sparky", is making me angrier, and we'll get you, and we'll get your mate Stuart, and we'll get the others, because they have acted reprehensibly on behalf of the ratepayers of Blue Mountains.

Mr Ray Hadley Ms Gabrielle Upton MP RAY HADLEY: For the last couple of weeks I've been talking in detail about Blue Mountains City Council, and I have revealed, with the help of whistleblowers inside council, serious misconduct within the council. I'm in possession of a report, which I detailed last week, showing council knew about asbestos contamination in its Springwood depot as early as 2014, but didn't take any action until May this year, almost three years. Information I've received suggests council has also known about asbestos at many other sites, but failed to act, including a preschool.

I also have been reporting a boys' club within senior ranks of council who have used bullying tactics to prevent staff from speaking out. This group consists, allegedly, of Stuart Liddell, who's now stood down as acting general manager; Grant McKay; John Hargreaves, a golfing partner of Mr Liddell's; Robert Greenwood, the outgoing general manager; and Mark Bruhn.

On Friday, I revealed emails between some of the men which confirmed they didn't follow required procedures when awarding lucrative contracts to Mark Mulligan, known as "Marky the Sparky". Mark Mulligan previously worked with Stuart Liddell at Essential Energy, and I am told they are very close friends.

While Robert Greenwood and Mark Bruhn are no longer at council - well, Greenwood's about to go and Bruhn went earlier this year with a payment - and Stuart Liddell has been stood down, Mark Mulligan remains as the director, service delivery.

I wanted to speak to the Minister for Local Government, Gabrielle Upton, about this one, and the minister's online. Minister, good morning.

GABRIELLE UPTON MP: Morning, Ray.

RAY HADLEY: Have you got the documents that I've been referring to, or has your office got copies of it?

GABRIELLE UPTON MP: I believe the Office of Local Government has those documents, Ray, and possibly more. Look, it is - they are, and there are a lot of them there, very serious allegations.

RAY HADLEY: Well, they're a bit more than allegations.

I've got in front of me an email from a purchasing 1 2 coordinator, leaked to me by someone who's no longer 3 employed by council. It talks about consulting services 4 for MA&SE Mulligan to the value of \$65,000. This was when he was not full time, but a contractor. Once again, no 5 6 reference to quotations received, the tender quote referred 7 to "NA", not applicable. This is the second order raised this year, on this supply, with possibly no quotes 8 received, which once again raises the possibility of 9 supplier favouritism. 10 11 12 I then have a report from Mark Bruhn. Mark Bruhn, in answering the request from this particular purchasing 13 coordinator, said: 14 15 Written quotation guidelines as follows --16 17 he has downloaded something --18 19 normal practice is for quote numbers or 20 TRIM records to be referred to in the text 21 22 of the requisition. I suggest Grant --23 24 that would be Grant McKay --25 26 produce a document for each purchase, 27 analysis and acceptance of written quotations report, for you to approve and 28 29 accept. 30 31 That was after this bloke's already been employed. are asking someone, the purchasing coordinator, to do 32 something that's guite illegal - to raise documents that 33 34 should have been done before this bloke's company was 35 contracted to the council. 36 Now, it gets a bit worse than that. This all started, 37 as you would appreciate, minister, when we were told about 38 39 asbestos contamination at Springwood, Lawson and 40 Blackheath. 41 Now, I've got documents in front of me that you may 42 43 not have yet, but it talks about exactly what's happened at the place, Blue Mountains council: 44 45

have major concerns about the way the

council has managed the asbestos management process at the site. We're concerned that the council's senior management is not taking its responsibility to ensure the health and safety of all employees. Between March 2014 and November 2015, the Blue Mountains council received three asbestos audits and reports from Airsafe that identified in over 100 buildings and work sites. These reports formed the basis of the asbestos register. The register identified a number of corrective actions that needed to be done. However, this information was not made available or forwarded to staff until May of this year. An asbestos register was not created or distributed out to the affected workers until June of this year. The Blue Mountains council did not have an asbestos management plan until October of this year.

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And I can add to the concerns for - apart from the workers at Springwood, at Lawson and Blackheath, because today I will reveal that there is a preschool in the area that had a concern about asbestos, and again, the council took no action in identifying and correcting what had been identified.

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Now, Katoomba Falls Kiosk is another one that I've got in front of me; the Solitary Restaurant is another one; the Warrimoo Citizens' Hall is another one. It just goes on The Springwood depot gardener's shed, which and on and on. I've spoken about, and now this one, Wentworth Falls Kindergarten Preschool, the serious matter regarding children at the Wentworth Falls Preschool Kindergarten potentially being exposed to asbestos. December 2014, Airsafe inspected the Wentworth Falls Kindergarten Preschool and found large amounts of asbestos material in and outside the building. Nothing was done for 18 months. Nothing was done for 18 months.

Now, I've been calling on you for a week to take some action. This council --

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GABRIELLE UPTON MP: Well, Ray --

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RAY HADLEY: -- Minister, needs to be sacked.

GABRIELLE UPTON MP: Yes, so, Ray, look, they are incredibly serious things that you raise. There is already a preliminary investigation under way. That is the formal process under the Act, the Local Government Act, and today, we have a senior investigator from the Office of Local Government who is going to council. It is to further gather the evidence, because steps beyond this require that evidence to stack up, so that we can make sure the seriousness is met with the consequence. So that is taking place today as we speak.

Well, the problem is that anyone that spoke RAY HADLEY: out has either been terminated or put on extended leave or, in the case of Mark Bruhn, paid out and sent packing, and signed a confidentiality agreement. But I've got all these documents, and they come from inside council, because staff have had a gutful of the actions of the general manager who's going; of Liddell, who's suspended himself; of Greenhill, the mayor; and a whole range of other people who have put the workers, the staff, and kids, now, at risk. I might also mention that Wentworth Falls Preschool, 2014; asbestos is identified at Katoomba Leura Preschool as early as 2007. Kids there were put at risk. And every document you find - and we've known about asbestos, Minister, I checked this morning, since 1943 and earlier. 1943 we first identified the dangers of asbestos.

 This mob have allowed workers, and a whole range of other people, to be at risk, and they won't know for decades and decades and decades whether they've been affected by it.

GABRIELLE UPTON MP: Ray, and that is why I've taken those steps today. As I said, there are a range, a very broad range, of matters that are raised here, some of which you've raised this morning on radio and over the last while, and that is why we have a senior investigator there today. That is so that we can assess formally what we can do. It's the legal process we're going through.

I don't want to say too much on air, as you appreciate, about that process, but we have to do the process to be able to get to an outcome, which, as you say, would seem to indicate there will be some incredibly serious consequences for people involved.

Well, let's hope so. Could you let us know RAY HADLEY: when you have got to that stage? GABRIELLE UPTON MP: I will, Ray. I will keep you in touch, yes. Okay, thank you. That's the Minister for RAY HADLEY: Local Government, Gabrielle Upton. The investigation starts today and I hope that it's finished before Christmas, and I hope some people are sent packing well and truly before then. END OF AUDIO

RAY HADLEY: Breaking news, 14 to 10, 14 to 9 in Queensland, and I've been calling this for the last three weeks, and it's finally happened.

In New South Wales, the Local Government Minister, Gabrielle Upton, has issued Blue Mountains City Council a notice of intention to suspend it following serious allegations relating to its asbestos management practices. The council now has seven days to respond to the notice and put forward an alternative case, or face being suspended and an interim administrator appointed. Councillors will remain in place during the seven-day response period.

### The minister said:

I am concerned the council is not functioning effectively following the volume and scope of recent regulatory notices issued by SafeWork New South Wales and the EPA, including SafeWork's decision to launch a full investigation into the council's management of asbestos, the significance of the problem identified in these notices and the level of community concern.

Under the Local Government Act, a council can be suspended for three months, an interim administrator appointed, to restore its proper or effective functioning. The Act requires the Minister to give notice of intention, providing the Council with the opportunity to make any submissions on the intention to suspend.

In other words, we are very, very, very close to an administrator being appointed for the dysfunctional Blue Mountains City Council. I will be talking to one of the councillors who's done a fantastic job, the Greens Councillor, Councillor Brown, in the next hour of the program.

 Now, I mentioned earlier that we'd had some success in relation to Blue Mountains City Council and their absolute disregard for their constituents and workers in relation to asbestos.

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I now have an all-staff memo from the acting general manager, Rosemary Dillon. She says:

Dear staff,

I regret to inform you, I have this morning been advised by the Office of Local Government they will today serve the Council with a notice of intent to suspend Councillors of the Council. The proposed suspension is for a period of three months, during which time an interim administrator would be appointed under the Local Government Act. The Council has seven days I will address staff in the to respond. Council Chambers at 11am. Attendance is optional but encouraged.

Directors and group managers will also be briefed as a matter of priority.

Please be assured that the mayor and I are working for the very best outcome for the council, for our staff and for the city.

While this has come as a shock, given how hard we have been working --

oh, yeah, blah, blah, blah, blah. They haven't implemented the asbestos plan they should have implemented four years ago, and they still haven't implemented it today. Well, they pretended they have, but they haven't.

 Now, as I've been telling you, I have concerns about serious misconduct, apart from the asbestos out there. Council failed to act for years after being alerted to potential asbestos exposure on a number of sites, including preschools. Wentworth Falls Preschool is now closed. I've been reporting about a boys' club within the senior ranks of council, who have been using bullying tactics to prevent staff from speaking about their concerns about asbestos. The group I allege consists of Stuart Liddell, who's suspended, at the moment on pay; Grant McKay; Mark Mulligan, a mate of Liddell's, appointed by Liddell, known as "Marky the Sparky"; Robert Greenwood, who's

 retired; and Mark Bruhn, among others.

Last month I detailed emails between some of these men which confirmed they didn't follow required procedures when awarding lucrative contracts to Mark Mulligan.

I can now reveal I'm in possession of a mayoral minute from a confidential council meeting in August where a restructure of the organisation was approved. This restructure included an important change to the director of service delivery role, which was given to "Marky the Sparky" - Mark Mulligan.

The mayoral minute says:

The new Director of Service Delivery will be recruited on an interim basis, which provides the incoming General Manager --

that's Stuart Liddell, who's suspended at the moment --

the ability to determine the incumbent for that position.

This change enabled retiring general manager, Robert Greenwood, and soon to be acting general manager, Stuart Liddell, to quietly appoint Liddell's mate, Mulligan, to the role.

The Blue Mountains Greens Councillor, Kerry Brown, opposed the restructure and changes to the director's role, and even introduced a rescission motion in October. Councillor Brown has been working tirelessly to maintain pressure on council over staff appointments and asbestos exposure issues.

You may remember I played you audio of Councillor Brown being shouted down by the mayor, Mark Greenhill, after she raised concerns about council's failures in managing asbestos. At last night's council meeting she introduced two more motions. We're going to find out about them in a moment.

I wanted to speak to the Greens Councillor, Kerry Brown, this morning. Now, let me tell you about this lady, and I want to declare this: it wouldn't matter to me who Kerry Brown is aligned to, she could be Green, brown,

Callithumpian, Labor, Liberal or Conservative. The reason I rely upon Kerry Brown is because I am told by people in the community: "This is a very community-minded person. She is a can-do person; not 'I will do ', she does things. She tells her constituents what she's going to do, and she does it", and the locals tell me she epitomises what local councillors should be all about, selflessly serving the community.

Kerry Brown, good morning.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: Oh, good morning, Ray. Thank you for that little tribute. That was very, very kind of you.

RAY HADLEY: Well, that's what they tell me, Councillor. I don't live out there, but your locals tell me, "This is a woman that does things and gets things done." So I commend you for that.

Now, if I can get to the motions last night, similar to your motion that was voted down in November or October, proposing council's work health and safety - what was the outcome of the motion you put to council last night?

COUNCILLOR BROWN: They did agree to it. There was a slight - there were two motions. One was to look at getting full work health and safety Australian Standard accreditation.

RAY HADLEY: Right.

 COUNCILLOR BROWN: Which would mean that we really went across all the risks that we have in our properties and we have independent auditors coming in, you know, forever - like not just once, but that we have to meet the top standards, which means we have to spend a lot more on training and on getting a risk register. And so there has been resistance, but certainly last night - I think the councillors are finally beginning to understand: actually, we are the governing body. And, to be honest, I think we've been slow to realise that, and so people are now a bit shocked to think, "Yes, if we haven't got work health and safety in place, ultimately, the buck did stop with us." So they did agree to it last night.

RAY HADLEY: Oh, good.

 COUNCILLOR BROWN: But it seems, now, we may have come in a bit late on that.

RAY HADLEY: Yeah.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: In terms of what the minister's now deciding.

RAY HADLEY: Well, I've got to tell you, and you'd know that, that I've been advocating that the - you know, the council be replaced by an administrator on a short-term basis. Because I've got to tell you, while I have complete confidence in you - and I've told the minister that, Councillor Brown - I have no confidence in your mayor, none whatsoever. None at all.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: Yeah, I mean, I suppose I wouldn't speak to a personality on this. I do think that there's really long-term cultural problems, and - which you and your researcher, Zoe, have done amazing work identifying, and clearly the workers have come to you. And that's for me - you know, as we've said before, you and I have very different political views, probably, but on this one, it really comes down to the workers and the community.

RAY HADLEY: Mmm.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: And I - you know, of course, as a councillor, it would be sad to think, well, we've been suspended, but we - it's sort of like you have to take - we took responsibility for overseeing a billion dollars of assets, 80,000 constituents, I think nearly 600 workers - we are responsible.

RAY HADLEY: Sure.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: So if it hasn't been right - and I presume the minister will give us reasons and then there will be some detail on this.

RAY HADLEY: Yeah, I'm sure.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: And we - you know, I think it's a bit of a learning curve. It's a learning curve for anyone who ever runs for council.

RAY HADLEY: Mmm.

2 COUNCILLOR BROWN: 3

It's not - it's not to be taken

lightly.

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RAY HADLEY: No.

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COUNCILLOR BROWN: You know, you - in the end, we - if we have to take responsibility for the fact that there were not the right - there was not an asbestos management plan in place. Those are facts.

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RAY HADLEY: Now, if I can get to a second issue, Councillor Brown, I'm in possession of this mayoral minute from a confidential council meeting back in August, where a restructure of the organisation was approved, but it appears to me that this - they've tried to - it has many, many pages of it, but I - thanks to Zoe and help from others, I've determined the restructure was simply all about making sure that either the former general manager or the incoming general manager, being Mr Liddell, who's no longer there at the moment, had an opportunity to simply appoint to the director of service delivery role their mate, or Mr Liddell's mate more particularly, Mark Mulligan. Now, it appears that it's a whole lot of gobbledygook, but the main thrust of it is that it gives him the right to appoint this one specific person to this one specific job. Is that your understanding of it?

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37 38 COUNCILLOR BROWN: I mean, it's the only - it is a bit it's another one of those documents where you read it and you think "What?" "What are they actually telling me here?" Most of what's in there did not have to come to The only thing that needed approval was that councillors. the director role become an interim role, which means it doesn't go out to full - it doesn't get advertised under the Government Employment Act; it simply gets - as you say, that role can then, because it's for one year instead of permanently, it can be appointed without the normal that's my understanding.

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RAY HADLEY: Yeah.

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46 47 COUNCILLOR BROWN: And, I mean, at the time I had no idea why that would be the case, but then you're looking at it and thinking, "Why are they doing that?" But I rescinded -I put up the rescission motion because I thought (a) we were going to be spending more money, it was going to cost

us more because there were all these other upgrades of people's positions, and it didn't make any sense. The general manager's leaving, there's no way we should be restructuring right - he should not be proposing a restructure as he goes out the door.

RAY HADLEY: Sure. Sure.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: So, that's it. And the only thing that we really needed to approve that couldn't have been done anyway was that change to that one role, so, you are correct in that. You're correct.

RAY HADLEY: Well, it appeared, like, "Oh, we're looking at a whole range of different things" - and you've pin-pointed it - but it was all about providing an opportunity for Mr Liddell, as the incoming general manager, to appoint Mark Mulligan to this role, and that's the start and finish of it. It doesn't go anywhere else.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: Yeah, but of course none of the councillors understood that. I mean, I suppose I'm the one who, if I don't understand something, I don't want to vote for it.

RAY HADLEY: Sure.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: So I'm a bit - but, you know, that, for me, is, "I don't know why we're doing this, but I can see it's going to cost more money, and I can see that someone leaving should not be making changes."

RAY HADLEY: Sure.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: Because the next person who comes in should decide what's done, so --

RAY HADLEY: Exactly.

 COUNCILLOR BROWN: So there was certainly - I was very, very uncomfortable with it. And for me, that means you don't do something. And I think it's a real - it's very important for councillors to not - to learn about not voting for things that we're not sure on or that we don't think we're being given the full information on. And that for me, as I've said before, Ray, I have struggled, in my first - in my year as a councillor, to feel that I have got

the information.

RAY HADLEY: Sure.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: And one of the things is we didn't have the information we needed about safety. We did not. And we didn't probably ask the right questions and we have learned something quite hard, that when we don't ask and we don't push really hard --

RAY HADLEY: Yeah.

RAY HADLEY: Sure.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: Which is what's happened.

RAY HADLEY: Now, I played my audience the audio of you being - I mean, there's no nice way to put it - shouted down by the mayor when you wanted to make a statement at a recent meeting, and the council's lawyer, Trevor Cork, urging councillors, including you, to be mindful what you say in public, because it could lead to legal action. If they have exposed people to asbestos knowingly, and that's what we believe they have done, well, obviously there will be legal action. But, I mean, at the end of the day, the truth must prevail, must it not?

 COUNCILLOR BROWN: Absolutely. And I mean - and I, you know, I had every right to say what I was saying. not just making allegations, and I said things like our work health and safety has lacked things that the law requires of us, such as the register - the asbestos register and a management plan. That was a fact. I think that's where the focus has been wrong. We should always have been focused on, very quickly, on the fact that it looks like the council has let down workers and the community for a long time. We should not have been worried about our own skins. We should not have been worried about protecting council. That's my view. We should have been worried, immediately, about what's happened with the are they all being tested, are we doing everything we can now, both to make sure those who appear to have been affected are given everything we can give them, the best care - and remembering, Ray, that none of

these people who have been exposed to asbestos have any right to compensation unless they get sick in decades to come and can prove it.

RAY HADLEY: Yes.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: So it's a terrible form of - it's a dreadful form of negligence, if that's what it is, which I think it is. I'm willing to say that. Because the - you know, people get put under enormous stress. In some cases, their children or their wives may also have to be tested.

RAY HADLEY: Sure.

 COUNCILLOR BROWN: But they don't get compensation, which - you know, for the fear they now have to live with. So that - you know, that should have been where we worried.

RAY HADLEY: Exactly.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: That's where I'm worried. That's where I feel bad.

 RAY HADLEY: Anyway, I'm sorry that the minister's decision will impact on you individually, but I think it's for the greater good and, as I've said previously, you have my support, it will continue, because you are a fair and decent person.

 As you've already indicated, we may have different persuasions in relation to policies and politics, but that doesn't mean I won't support someone who's right. In this particular matter, Councillor Brown, you're a hundred per cent right and I thank you for your time.

COUNCILLOR BROWN: Thank you very much, Ray.

 RAY HADLEY: Thank you. That's Kerry Brown, a Greens councillor at the Blue Mountains City Council, which is about to be suspended. They have seven days to reply to the minister, and they should hang their heads in collective shame. Mayor Greenhill, shame on you. To pinch one from Derryn, "Shame, shame, shame". Councillor Greenhill, shame on you. Mark Mulligan, get back to Bathurst and stay there. Liddell, get back to the golf course and improve your handicap, you don't deserve the general manager's job.

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Now, as I said, Mark Greenhill, the disgraced Labor mayor of the Blue Mountains City Council, has spoken to the ABC this morning, trying to justify what Minister Upton has done, giving them seven days before she suspends the council. This is what he's had to say to the ABC:

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22 23 Asbestos issues that have been raised are deeply troubling, and of course the elected councillors, you know, don't literally physically run the operational part of the council, but our job is to hold it to account when these issues arise. In the last few months as these issues have come up, we've just - we've done exactly that. We've said to our officers. "Well, you need to do exactly what the State Government requires of you to do and you need to work with the government to ensure, as we do, that all of these matters are addressed." Now, we've done that. And yet it's the elected body that's cooperated that's being dismissed. On that - well, I should say, suspended.

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I can only conclude that that is a politically motivated decision, because it is the political arm, not the operational arm, that this impacts.

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RAY HADLEY: Well, it's a very heavy expression, but Mark Greenhill is an unabashed liar. He's known personally - personally - about the asbestos problems in the Blue Mountains, not just for the last few months since May, in fact, but he's known about it since 2014, and I've got documented evidence to state that he has known about it. So he's lying to the ABC. He's a liar. An unmitigated liar, Mark Greenhill, and I'll defend my right to say that with proof, that he's lied to the presenter on He's known about the asbestos problem, and he's the ABC. done nothing about it, since 2014. Done nothing about it until 2017. He's a liar. He continued:

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46 47 I think what needs to happen is that we need to get to the bottom of what has happened with asbestos management, get an outcome, get an inquiry outcome that tells

 us what the facts actually are, analyse those facts and act on them. The investigation into the asbestos issues was only announced by the minister on Monday night.

"The investigation". They are - it's Caesar investigating Caesar. They initiate their own inquiry to be conducted by someone appointed by their lawyer - their own lawyer, who's been their lawyer for three or four decades. They had to be dismissed, suspended, because they have done nothing about the inherent asbestos problem in the Blue Mountains for at least three years we know, possibly longer, and Mark Greenhill has known that. So to suggest that this is some sort of politically motivated witch-hunt is just nonsense, absolute and utter nonsense, and he knows it.

Participants: Mr Ray Hadley Mr Matt Keane MP

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Now, we go from that to other matters, and RAY HADLEY: I'm on again about Blue Mountains council, and let me just say, again, the decision by Gabrielle Upton on 22 December to give this mob a second chance beggars belief. presided over inaction in the management and control of asbestos at buildings and sites across the Blue Mountains for a number of years. They shouldn't be in the position they're in now, in power.

I thank Matt Kean, the New South Wales Minister for Better Regulation, because when Upton was sitting on her hands last year, Kean got SafeWork New South Wales to work and they did a good job, closing down places, including a preschool at Wentworth Falls that had asbestos there. Now that's open. Hopefully, people have moved in and made sure it's safe for the children attending that preschool. The building's owned by the Blue Mountains City Council.

And I'm saying, today, Blue Mountains City Council have proven once again why they can't be trusted to fix these problems with asbestos.

Yesterday, union delegates closed parts of the council's Springwood depot after discovering asbestos material had not been treated as it should have been - in poor condition.

The human [sic] resources and waste services building at the depot remains closed this morning after that discovery.

Council staff tell me the asbestos material in this building was identified by SafeWork New South Wales in December as being needed to be either sealed or removed.

Now, I'm told council hired SafeWork New South Wales licensed asbestos removalist, a company called Beasy, to remove or seal the asbestos at the site, and SRL [sic] Consulting to issue a clearance certificate for the work that was done. However, multiple areas of asbestos at the site remain damaged or in poor condition.

The New South Wales Minister for Innovation and Better Regulation, Matt Kean, is the minister responsible for SafeWork New South Wales. He's on the line. Minister, good morning.

MATT KEAN MP: Ray, great to hear you back on air.

RAY HADLEY: Good to be back. Now, you - let me do this correctly: not "you". Your colleague threw a lifeline to this reprehensible council and its mayor on December 22, which I don't understand. The council promised on December 22, to Gabrielle Upton, your colleague, they would now handle such matters in the correct fashion, after ignoring the pleas of residents and workers for quite some time.

However, having made that promise to Gabrielle Upton, workers notified senior council staff about the asbestos problems at the waste services office on January 9 - January 9 - but council didn't notify SafeWork of the problem until yesterday. Is that the way a council operates to be responsible, Minister?

MATT KEAN MP: Ray, it just beggars belief, and my confidence in Blue Mountains City Council is at an all-time low.

 RAY HADLEY: Well, can you pick up the phone, either ring the Premier or ring the lightweight Local Government Minister and tell her what a botched mess she's made of this? Because I'm telling you, Matt, it's a bloody disgrace, an absolute disgrace, that this mob are still in charge. Honestly, if they told you it was raining in the Blue Mountains, you'd have to go outside and check. They're unmitigated liars, and Upton has fallen for them hook, line and sinker. Hook, line and sinker. It's a disgrace, Matt.

MATT KEAN MP: Ray, it is - it just beggars belief that they've had SafeWork crawling all over their sites, issuing remediation orders, in some cases closure orders, yet they've failed to inform the regulator, being SafeWork, of another find of asbestos. I mean, I have no confidence. It's totally irresponsible and raises very serious questions about council's attitude to asbestos and their workers.

RAY HADLEY: Well, there appears to have been some remediation work done on some of the areas of that asbestos in question that I'm referring to here. However - however - there is still asbestos there. The workers are phoning me, they're emailing me and saying, "Ray, please

help us. This mob are not doing what they should be doing."

Now, they got the SafeWork New South Wales licensed asbestos removalist in; they got another mob in to issue a clearance certificate. But the workers say it's still there; it hasn't been made safe as it was supposed to be made safe. And yet again, we have the minister responsible - not you, your colleague, Gabrielle Upton - putting her faith in them and saying, "Oh, they told me it would be okay."

I'll repeat what I just said: that staff at that site contacted the council, senior staff at the council, on 9 January. Council did not notify your organisation, being SafeWork, of the problem until yesterday. And now, let me just say, Matt, there's some backside covering. There's a very coarse expression that I won't use here, because it would be unpalatable, but there is a bit of [beep] covering going on out there from your staff, okay? SafeWork I'm calling out. A bit of that covering going on out there, because they've come back and said, "Oh, look, it's not as bad as they're making out."

 If you get one of those fibres in your lungs, in 30 years' time when you're committing, you know, yourself to a life of misery, well, the bloke from SafeWork that said in 2018, "It's not as bad as you think", he might have a bit to answer for, because asbestos is a deadly, deadly, deadly way of contracting all sorts of diseases, and we can't have workers or members of the public put at risk, even if there's a minimal risk.

MATT KEAN MP: Yeah, you're spot on. This is an insidious thing, it's dangerous, and we cannot take any shortcuts whatsoever.

So I've spoken to the head of SafeWork this morning and yesterday. A team of inspectors are going up there right now to get to the bottom of what's gone on, Ray, and I'll come back to you with further information.

 RAY HADLEY: Well, the bloke you sent up yesterday said, "Oh, there's a minor risk." Well, if there's a minor risk, let him go out there without masks on and without protective gear and work there all day for eight hours and see how he likes it.

MATT KEAN MP: Yeah --

RAY HADLEY: The bloody workers deserve better than that, I'm telling you, Minister.

MATT KEAN MP: You're spot on, and no matter how small the risk, you can't take any chances with this stuff, as you said. So we're not going to take any chances. A team of inspectors is going up there tomorrow. I'll keep you in the loop as to what's going on.

Look, just on another matter, in RAY HADLEY: Okay. September last year you ordered a review of SafeWork's processes for granting these licences to these people after revelations companies associated with the - well, he's not convicted yet, but he will be shortly, because he's made admissions and police have charged him - Paul Mouawad illegally dumping asbestos out there at Arcadia. somehow held SafeWork asbestos removal licences, and he's a cowboy, a cowboy who was dumping asbestos left, right and centre at a range of sites, and we know all about that, from down towards Redfern way, out to the south-west, and also his involvement with what happened on Geelans Road, What's the outcome of that review that you put in Arcadia. place?

 MATT KEAN MP: Yeah, the first thing, Ray, as a result of what's happened in Arcadia, we've cancelled Mr Mouawad's licences immediately. So that's for Aussie Earthmovers and MC Civil Pty Limited. They were cancelled in October, 16 October last year.

RAY HADLEY: Mmm.

MATT KEAN MP: In addition to that, it beggars belief that someone could get a licence with past like this.

RAY HADLEY: Well, he had - let me just explain to our listeners who've forgotten about Mouawad - and they don't want to - apparently, he's wanting to change his name. He'll need a facelift as well; he needs a good plastic surgeon, because I know what he looks like. He'd already had a conviction from the Hills Shire Council for doing exactly what he did in Hornsby; he did it in the Hills area, out around Annangrove, I think.

 MATT KEAN MP: Well, we've reviewed the systems and processes in place. I've ordered an immediate review. We've looked at it. Now we'll be rolling out background checks for all the licences that SafeWork issues. So this shouldn't happen again, a character like Mr Mouawad getting a licence to handle such sensitive stuff like asbestos.

RAY HADLEY: You wouldn't think you'd have to do this review. I mean, commonsense, the pub test would be, "We've got a bloke here who has a conviction for the illegal dumping of material in the Hills Shire; but let's give him another licence so he can dump illegal material in the Hornsby Shire. Let's do that." I mean, you wouldn't think we'd need to put something in place, but, thank God we have something in place now.

MATT KEAN MP: You're spot on. What we relied on before was people filling in or admitting as to what their background was. Obviously, shonks and skivs like this don't do that. But now we're implementing a mandatory background check before we issue licences.

RAY HADLEY: Okay. All right. Well, I'll leave this in your capable hands and the capable hands of your staff going out there.

And, as I repeat, the inhalation of fibres of asbestos - I don't want to hear anyone from your department, or from the union, saying, "Oh, there's only a minor risk", because there are plenty of people in Rookwood who were subjected to a minor risk 40 and 50 years ago who died from mesothelioma, and we don't want that to happen in 50 years' time.

MATT KEAN MP: I don't care how small the risk is. We're not going to take any chances when it comes to asbestos, Ray.

RAY HADLEY: Okay. And perhaps you can talk to your colleague about - and explain to the people of New South Wales, among all the other things you have to explain, how she could possibly - possibly - say to that council, "Look, we're going to give you another chance. You've had 186, and now 187, because you didn't report what you should have reported on 9 January until 23 January, but we think you're going to do the right thing eventually". She is, fair dinkum, in cloud cuckoo land, your colleague

Gabrielle Upton, and she needs to pull her finger out and do something about this mob urgently. Urgently. I appreciate your time. MATT KEAN MP: Good on you, Ray. Thank you, Matt Kean. RAY HADLEY: **END OF AUDIO** 

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
